SOME THINGS TO NOTE:

Most information on Trusts and Trust Law is published by solicitor companies or those involved in offering services of preparing and managing trusts as a service for their clients, who are often wealthy individuals or organisations.

Usually, they will emphasise the need to use their services, citing that Trust Law is complicated and needs a professional, such as their company, to navigate it safely on your behalf. They will also often focus on the tax implications of Trusts.

It is entirely possible, however, to create and manage a Trust without their services, as long as you adhere to the three 'certainties' (basic requirements) for a Trust:

- Certainty of Intention: It must be clear that the Trust has a purpose, ie. the Trust has at least one Settlor and at least one Trustee, and it is clear that the Settlor intends to transfer ownership of their assets to the Trustee, to hold for the benefit of the Beneficiary or Beneficiaries.
- Certainty of Subject Matter: It must be clear which property and assets are being included in the Trust.
- Certainty of Objects: It must be clear to the Trustee who the Beneficiaries are.
